square of plywood on the ceiling reminds Fair Park teacher Dottie Lord that the window air conditioner cooling her room should be gone in August.

The plywood and tape-marked squares on classroom floors show where ducts and vents will run when work on a \$3.88 million air conditioning overhaul at the 77-year-old school starts in earnest the day after classes let out in May. Construction crews have just 72 days to install huge air conditioning units in three structures, including the threestory main building, run ducts and test the system.

"I prefer central air, but you've got to go with what you've got. I have a fairly old, but fairly reliable, window unit, knock on wood," Lord said, rapping her knuckles on her desk

Fair Park's work is the largest single project funded by \$88.29 million in bonds voters approved a year ago. More than 80 percent of the money will be spent on air conditioning. Most projects involve replacing window units, some of them 30 years old, with central air conditioning. Other bond-funded projects
